Scouts Australia Funding Assistance.

The International Commissioner of Australia has identified additional funding that is now available for Youth Members who are in genuine need of assistance so they can remain a participant at the World Scout Jamboree.

Additional grants of up to \$3,000 are now available for Youth Members in the Australian Contingent.

Eligible participants must have an application that is "NHQ Approved" and must NOT be attending the Optional Post-Tour.

Grants are limited to a maximum of \$3,000 or the outstanding balance of your Australian Contingent Fee.

Recipients of funding assistance are required to submit a report or edited video of their experience within 3 weeks of their return from the event.

To apply, please write to the International Commissioner at <u>int.comm@scouts.com.au</u> with a confidential explanation of your financial hardship no later than 31 January 2019. Please include a summary of why attending the World Scout Jamboree is important to you and a description of your previous fundraising efforts.

The Jamboree Program.

Over the coming newsletters we are going to introduce to you some of the major activities you can participate in. The two for this newsletter are the "Aquatic Adventures" and the "Rocks".

Rocks

When it opened in 2013 The Summit boasted the largest man-made climbing facility in the world. Climbing activities include bouldering, traditional top-rope, and auto-belayed climbing, rappelling (abseiling) and the Leap of Faith. These take place at two locations, The Rocks, and Boulder Cove. Both are inspired by the popular climbing routes in the nearby New River Gorge and hand sculpted to resemble the natural rock of the region.

The Rocks

The Larger of the two climbing venues at The Summit, The Rocks is located in Adventure Valley and features:

- 6 freestanding boulders
- 72 top-rope climbing station

- 30 rappelling (abseiling) stations
- o 6 leap of faith lanes
- 35 auto-belay climbing stations

Boulder Cove

Located In the summit center, overlooking Goodrich Lake, Boulder Cove packs plenty of climbing adventure into a smaller space.

- 3 free-standing boulders
- 24 auto-belayed climbing stations

Fun Facts

- 60,000 square feet (1,375 linear feet) of rock wall
- 233 climbing routes
- 200 tons of steel

Aquatics Adventures

Water Reality Obstacle Course

- Water Reality Obstacle Course is a timed 4-person team event
- There are 7 courses with 5 obstacles in each course
- Best team times and overall Jamboree times will be posted each day!

Scuba

- \circ The Scuba activity at the Jamboree is the largest introductory Scuba experience in the world!
- The four 40-foot by 80-foot Scuba pools were custom built for use at Jamborees
- The four pools allow 600 Scouts per hour to breathe underwater!

Kayak

- 190 Kayaks on its own lake!
- \circ $\;$ Something for beginner through advanced paddlers

Stand-Up Paddleboard (SUP)

- 4 beaches of traditional SUPs
- 1 dock system for Team SUP, a new SUP activity for 6 people on a large SUP
- 176 traditional SUPS and 16 Team SUPs

• 2,740 cubic yards of concrete

• 12 rappelling (abseiling) stations.

- 50,000 t-nuts
- 7,756 climbing holds

Troop Campsites.

The Summit Bechtel Reserve is divided into five base camps for Jamboree participants Agra Fort (A), Blenheim Palace (B), Canadian Rockies (C), Durham Castle (D) and Fort Jesus (F). All of our 15 Troops will be scattered between these base camps.

You will be provided with a tent which will sleep two people, as well as stretchers to sleep on, picnic tables and Troop cooking gear for your Troop site.

Permanent shower houses and toilet blocks are located throughout the base camps. Do make note showers have no hot water at the world jamboree water is only heated by the sun during the day.

An additional Base Camp is provided for members of the International Service Team (IST) which is Base Camp Echo (E). IST members will live in wall tents with bunk style stretchers. IST members however do not have to cook their own food. Meals are supplied it in 1 massive dining hall.

Dining.

The jamboree will be using the grocery store model for troop meals. Troops will develop a menu then go shop for the ingredients in their base camp store to cook breakfast and dinner. A packed lunch will be provided.

At the beginning of the jamboree Troops will be given an allocation of points to shop with throughout the jamboree. These points must last for the duration of the jamboree so careful meal planning will be required. In addition to this shopping is done using an App on your mobile phone to scan shopping items into your trolley. This also makes exiting the grocery store much simpler.

Personal Expectations.

When travelling to an overseas Scouting event, all members become important ambassadors of Australia.

Being an ambassador for Australia carries with it great honour and great responsibility. Your words and actions will be very visible to other participants and special guests. Any inappropriate behaviour reflects poorly on yourself, on the Australian Contingent, and on Australia in general.

Bullying and harassment are never acceptable at any Scouting event. It is therefore essential that every member of the Australian Contingent demonstrates their best behaviour at all times. Your involvement in other Scouting activities prior to our departure will also be considered by the Contingent.

Whilst in America and/or Canada, it is vital that every participant actively engages in the entire cultural experience on offer. We know that you will have the opportunity to experience a new culture, new foods and new activities. You are encouraged to attempt every task with maturity and demonstrate great respect in everything you do.

Importantly, any member of the Contingent that demonstrates unsuitable behaviour during our journey will be returned to Australia at your own personal cost. It is therefore trusted that you will Do Your Best to live up to the Scout Law and Promise.

Introducing Workplace by Facebook.

In the lead up to and over the course of the Jamboree and as we get home, the Contingent has adopted Workplace by Facebook to use for communication to and between the Contingent Members.

The CMT will be using this to communicate with everyone as the Jamboree site is very large and we won't be physically able to get around to everyone everyday.

Workplace by Facebook is the next generation communication hub that connects everyone in our Contingent. Workplace by Facebook will help us make faster decisions, understand the Contingent's needs, passions and provides an accessible and quick way of communicating.

Each Contingent Member would have received a login to Workplace now, to their primary email address registered in the Registration System. Access to the Workplace system will only be provided to the Member of the Contingent. It's important to ensure that if the Contingent Member has a mobile phone that they download the **Workplace** App and **Work Chat** App from the App Store or Google Play Store.

IST Update from Harry Long.

G'day All

I write this having come up for air (temporarily) from the position of Camp Chief for AJ2019. The fun in Scouting never ends!

I commend those members of the International Services Team (IST) who have proactively initiated many chats via the Workplace Jamboree Site. There is sooooooo much information on a wide variety of World Jamboree related websites, but I encourage you to concentrate most of your attention on the official website for the 24th World Jamboree site that has accurate and timely information related to frequently asked questions and information related to specific IST placement and responsibilities. These are updated from time-to-time so revisit trusted sites over time.

It takes specialised skills to host a World Jamboree experience. The World Jamboree Host Committee (with representation from the National Scout Associations (NSOs) of Canada, Mexico and the United States) plans to make as many IST assignments as possible in advance of arrival at the Summit. Consideration of factors such as a candidate's skills, areas of interest and experience will likely assist the selection process. IST applicants need to be vetted by their NSO before an IST appointment is considered. Inevitably, some IST applicants will not know their Jamboree role before the event. As well, some IST applicants may find they are placed in roles that are unsuitable for any of a number of reasons. All of us should be conscious of our primary role - to serve the youth participants by doing our part to deliver a great World Jamboree experience. Having said the above, one of my responsibilities is to serve you and to ensure, to the best of my ability, that you are placed in a Jamboree role that brings a sense of purpose and satisfaction!

Just as with our own Jamborees, countless program and operational responsibilities and roles

need to be filled. Think of a city with a population of between fifty and sixty thousand people and the roles that keep a community of similar size functioning. All of these roles will be required. Specific IST position availability has been made known to you in previous correspondence and links. Our IST arrival dates have been communicated to you in the last newsletter.

Physical conditions in West Virginia in July/August will be challenging for many. West Virginia in summer can be, and often is, hot and humid. Thunderstorms in the afternoon are quite common. Plan to bring rainwear. As well, while the trails are well-maintained, the aggregate base for the trails is uneven and care must be taken not to turn an ankle or sustain a soft-tissue injury. The trails can save you a great amount of time getting to your place of work over the time taken by walking the roadways. Motorised transport may be an option for some. This will largely depend on your work schedule and work location.

I have attended two American Jamborees at the site of the upcoming World Jamboree. In a word, the location is incredible. What will make this location unique from a World Jamboree perspective, is the emphasis on adventurous activities, readily at hand! I encourage you to visit the related websites to see first-hand what our Scouts and Venturers are going to be experiencing. The usual, and extremely important, social aspect to a World Jamboree will also receive suitable attention. In short, the site promises to deliver the very best social and adventurous activity-based program a Jamboree can provide. I look forward to working with you when we reach the Summit!

Contingent Gear & Optional Merchandise.

As mentioned in the last newsletter The Australian Contingent has organised and ordered a range of merchandise to be issued to all Contingent Members. This official gear will be used throughout the Jamboree.

Delivery of Contingent Gear to your Home Address will be done by mid March. You should expect 2 deliveries.

- One Delivery being your Contingent Hat
- And the other your Contingent Shirts, Badges, Bag Tags, Towels (If ordered), Power Banks (If ordered) and any additional Merchandise you may have ordered.
- Everything else (Travel Bag, Backpack, Drink Bottle, International Scarves, Name Bars) will be handed out at your O-Day.

O-Days.

Once more, we need to stress how important it is that you make sure that you are attending the Orientation day for your area. The O-Day will run for about 2 hours.

Selecting & Confirming your O-Day

So that we can adequately prepare for each O-Day follow the instructions below to choose which O-Day you will be attending. For locations with 2 sessions for the day it will be first in best dressed. This must be done by the **1st February, 2019**.

We need you to do the following NOW!

- 1. Log onto the registration system
- 2. Go to the "O-Day" page and select your prefered session.
- 3. Your prefered session will not show when the location is full.

If you are unable to attend any of the O-Days please select the **Please Contact Me** option and a member of the Contingent Management Team will contact you to discuss. Some people will have legitimate reasons due to distance and for these people we will make other plans to keep you informed. Please remember it is MANDATORY to attend 1 of the O-Days.

Flight Updates.

We have marked a huge milestone with the finalisation of all our flights for our trip. It has been an epic task and taken up huge amounts of time over the last few months. Some interesting facts for you about our flights are

- 1. We are flying on a total of 103 separate flights to make our trip work
- 2. We have booked a total of 4217 individual plane seats over the duration of our trip
- 3. We have spent just short of 2 million dollars to book all our flights.

By the time you read this newsletter you will be able to log on and view your individual flights in the registration system.

We need you to do the following NOW!

- 4. Log onto the registration system
- 5. Go to the "Travel Details" page and view your allocated flights.
- 6. Check your Departure and Arrival port to and from Australia.
- 7. Make sure your list of flights make logical sense.

Notes:

- For people departing and arriving to and from Karratha, Longreach, Cairns, Townsville, Mackay, Rockhampton and Canberra, we have assumed your home port based of your residential address listed in the registration system 4 months ago.
- 2. Everybody should arrive into Washington DC on the 17th July
- 3. Everybody should have a flights between Charlotte and Los Angeles on the 2nd August
- 4. Those not going to Canada should have flights back to Australia on the 4th August out of Los Angeles
- 5. Those going to Canada should have flights to Calgary on the 4th August from Los Angeles
- 6. Those coming home from Canada should have flights back to Australia via Los Angeles on the 9th August.

Airline Checked and Carry On Baggage.

It's time to start thinking now about what you want to take with you to the Jamboree. We have received some queries regarding checked and carry on baggage allowances with the airlines.

Checked Baggage

- The <u>Contingent Issued Travel Bag</u> is the only bag you are allowed to check in. You will only get one bag and this is all you are allowed to check in and it must be kept under 20 kgs.
- This limit is in place due to connecting domestic air tickets we have within the United States of America.
- If you turn up to the Airport with more than 1 bag to check in you will be asked to leave it in your home port.

Carry On Baggage

• The Contingent Issued Backpack is the only bag to be used as your Carry On Bag on all Flights during our trip. No other baggage will be allowed and the usual 7Kg limit is in place too.

A detailed Gear List will be issued in the March Newsletter, so sit tight and just start to think about what you think you would like to take.

Travel Insurance.

As part of your Contingent Fee all members of the Australian Contingent will be provided with Travel Insurance for our trip to the USA and Canada.

Our Travel Insurance is being provided through Chubb and will come into effect as of the 17th July 2019 for everyone. Travel Insurance is then valid until and including 1 of two dates. 6th August 2019 if you are just doing the main tour and the 11th August 2019 if you are attending the Canadian Post Tour.

For **Independent Travellers** you will be given travel Insurance during these dates unless you are attending the Canadian Post Tour your insurance will run out on the 6th August 2019. This is part of Scouts Australia's policy. **If you are travelling outside these dates it is your responsibility to arrange your own travel insurance.**

Mobile Phones and Devices.

The Jamboree is a very tech savvy environment and part of its running is the use of mobile phones to do various tasks such as looking up the wait time of certain activities. Going and doing the Food Shopping. The entire jamboree site is covered by Wifi.

Outside the Jamboree the contingent will use messages to mobile phones as one way of communicating with the contingent. It must be stressed that during our touring in Washington DC, Los Angeles and Calgary youth will be in patrols with an adult Line Leader so this will not be the only way of communicating.

The contingents view on bringing mobile phones is the following. **We encourage you to bring a mobile phone however it is not necessary nor mandatory to do so**. If you choose to do so it is your responsibility to look after. The contingent will not take responsibility for your phone being lost, stolen or damaged.

In upcoming Newsletters the contingent will also be issuing a policy around bringing Mobile Phones and Devices. Make sure you keep an eye out for this!

Other devices such as Drones, Laptops and IPads are not allowed.

Cameras are an optional choice for you to make. But do be reminded they are your responsibility to look after and if they become damaged, lost or stolen the contingent will not cover them. You must also be reminded should you choose to bring a camera it must fit within your given travel bags no additional space is available for camera bags.

Pocket & Spending Money.

This is one of the most common questions we have been getting is around how much spending money to take and how it will be looked after.

How much Spending Money Do I need?

This is very much a personal choice based of your spending habits but as a guide the Contingent would recommend somewhere between \$10 and a maximum of \$20 USD (United States Dollars) per day. It must be stressed that everything such as Transport, Meals and Activities is included as part of your contingent fee. The only thing you require spending money for is souvenirs and any snacks you wish to buy ie. Ice creams and soft drinks.

How do I take my Spending Money?

As of today the Contingents Plans are to issue everyone with a Travel Debit Card so that the contingent can place money for meals onto it when required. As a member of the Contingent, you will also be able to use this to load funds on yourself and then use this same card for spending money.

This is only a plan at this stage and awaiting final confirmations in the New Year, but we wanted to share you our thoughts! As we think it is super exciting!

Registration Process for Youth and Line Leaders with the Host Country.

The Contingent is currently in the process of finalising the upload of our Youth and Line Leaders into the American System. IST were done in October. Once we do this, you will receive an email from America. In the email you will be given a Registration Code and also a link, you will need to go there to get your forms. Download them, Print them and then Upload them into the American System. More information will come on this.
